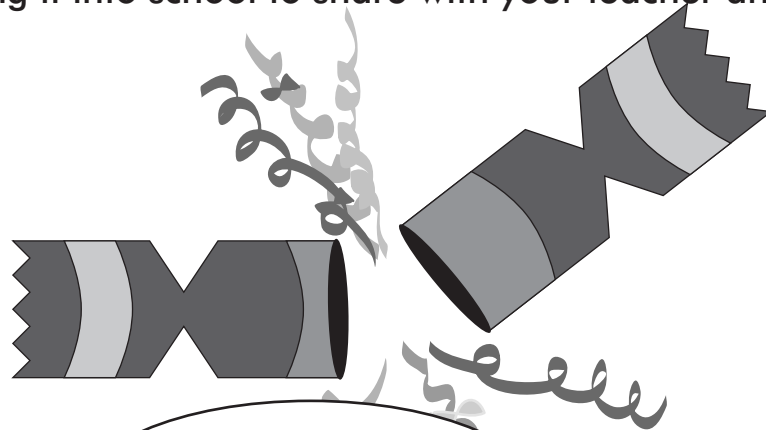


Christmas crackers!

Many seven and eight year old children LOVE (terrible) jokes. You could encourage your child to keep a little book of their favourite jokes, adding to it as time goes by (Christmas cracker jokes might be a good place to start). If you can face it, most libraries and bookshops have a wide range of joke-books for children of this age.

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1. When we pull open Christmas crackers, a joke usually falls out!
2. What is your favourite question and answer joke? (e.g. What smells worse than a pig in a sty? Two pigs in a sty!)
3. Ask your friends and family what their favourite question and answer joke is.
4. Pick the one you like best. (It mustn't be rude!)
5. Write it out carefully on a piece of paper.
6. Read it through so that you know it makes sense (Have you got a question mark?).
7. Practise reading it out loud.
8. Bring it into school to share with your teacher and friends.
